A message from the Executive Dean of the Faculty


Dear Staff and Students



ECDoE Teaching for All Launch – British Council Article British Council Partners with ECDoE and Nelson Mandela University for Teaching for All Programme Launch

The British Council, in collaboration with the Eastern Cape Department of Education (ECDoE) and Nelson Mandela University, launched the Teaching for All programme in the Eastern Cape on 23-24 April 2024. This initiative aims to transform the education by equipping teachers to support the diverse needs of all learners. The Teaching for All programme stems from extensive research on inclusive education in South Africa. It has developed open educational resources, including a 240-hour Bachelor of Education core module, with supplementary materials such as videos, student guides, lecture notes, and assessments.

The project unites stakeholders from the Department of Basic Education (DBE), Department of Higher Education and Training, provincial education departments, fourteen universities, and over 20 civil society organizations (CSOs) and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). These collaborations have led to a new conceptual framework for inclusive education in South Africa, emphasizing social justice and the social model of disability.

Since its inception in 2019, the programme has trained over 30,000 pre-service and 2,000 in-service teachers. The Eastern Cape teachers are the latest cohort to benefit from this model. Nelson Mandela University's Faculty of Education is crucial in the programme's roll-out in the Eastern Cape.

Acting Executive Dean Prof. Sathorar Heloise stated, "This initiative is a significant step in creating an inclusive educational environment. We are committed to supporting teachers with the necessary skills and knowledge to foster inclusive classrooms."

Prof. Cina Mosito from the Department of Primary School Education Foundation Phase added, "Our involvement underscores our dedication to educational equity. By collaborating with the British Council and ECDoE, we aim to empower teachers to make a real difference."

The programme's sustainable approach is facilitated by Nelson Mandela University's experienced Faculty of Education team, promising a close working relationship between the British Council, ECDoE, and the university. This collaboration aims for successful implementation and positive impacts on inclusive education practices across the province. The launch event highlighted the importance of this partnership and the shared commitment to fostering an inclusive educational system in South Africa, paving the way for a more equitable future in education. Fostering community engagement and support for education in rural areas:

Addressing a critical gap in access to information and opportunities

The partnership between Nelson Mandela University and iKamvelihle Development Trust has made an incredible impact, particularly by addressing broad societal challenges through contextually relevant support for schools in Cala.

The Centre for the Community School (CCS) hosted its second career exhibition for Chris Hani District schools at Cala Skills Centre. The event saw notable educational institutions and departments actively participating, including Access and Enrolment - Admissions, ICT Services, Communications and Marketing – Student Recruitment, Emthonjeni Student Wellness, Student Housing, Faculty of Education, Faculty of Science, Ikhala Tvet College, and the National Youth Development Agency (NYDA).

The exhibition was held at a pivotal moment in the academic journey of many young Grade 12 learners and out-of-school youth who passed in the previous year but didn't get the opportunity to apply then. Its significance lies not only in providing a platform for students to explore various career pathways but also in equipping them with the necessary information and resources to make informed decisions about their futures.

Eleven schools from Sakhisizwe Local Municipality, Chris Hani District attended, with a turnout of 786 learners, which increased by 30% from the first exhibition last year. Their participation emphasized the importance of community collaboration and provided students with access to resources and mentorship opportunities within their vicinity. This local engagement is crucial in bridging



the gap between academic aspirations and practical realities, offering a support network that extends beyond the confines of the exhibition hall.

The presence of Nelson Mandela University departments, NYDA, and Ikhala Tvert College added another layer of depth to the event. As esteemed institutions of higher learning, their involvement lent credibility and expertise to the proceedings. Students had the chance to interact directly with faculty members and current students, gaining invaluable insights into academic pathways, scholarship opportunities, and the overall university experience. Such interactions are instrumental in demystifying the transition from secondary to tertiary education, empowering students to make informed decisions about their future educational pursuits.

Learners came prepared with all the necessary documents required for application, as they were also done on-site, and free career counseling was provided to help learners identify their strengths, interests, and values. This understanding of how these factors align with different career options enables them to make choices that resonate with their passions and abilities. The success of this career exhibition demonstrates the positive impact of community engagement and support for education in rural areas., empowering students to make informed decisions about their future educational pursuits.

The B Ed 4th year Foundation phase students registered for PFAL300 (English FAL), had a picture walk in the classroom during their lecture time at Missonvale Campus.

Ms. Helen Septoo, their lecturer instructed her students to design A1/A3 posters. The students were instructed to choose their own story of choice, the poster is based on the book they have chosen. The posters consist of the title of the story, the type of the story, outlining the character, the setting of the story, the author's purpose, and explaining whether the story is fictional or non-fictional

The instruction was to make posters using minimum or no technology, use mostly poster paper and koki pens showcasing that you can teach and have resources on a minimal budget.

Faculty Of Education Well represented at AFRICANISATION/DECOLONISATION INDABA 2024

The Africanisation/Decolonisation Indaba that was held on Thursday the 7th and 8th of March 2024 provided a space for delegates from across the various faculties and entities of the Nelson Mandela University to critically reflect on how the institutional identity of the institution could be re-imagined with a focus on Africanisation and decolonisation. This is aligned to the university's name change in 2017 and the vision 2030 strategy.

The two-day indaba showcased the decolonisation/ Africanisation work undertaken by the various faculties in the institution, The indaba, which created opportunities for both face-to-face interaction and online participation, was well attended by students, staff and colleagues from both NMU and a range of other South African higher education institutions and NGO's.

On the first day of the conference the various faculties in the institution shared their experiences on the initiatives they embarked on to decolonise/ Africanise their faculties within the context of teaching and learning and the challenges and rewards. The Faculty of Education under the leadership of Prof Shervanie Pillay and her team delivered a presentation entitled 'Decolonisation and Africanisation: What does this mean in a Faculty of Education?' in which they shared their insights and experiences on how they grappled with the concepts, given that it was open to multiple interpretations and perspectives. Each of the members of the team provided reflections on their individual work in decolonisation within the contexts of their own areas of expertise and how they were still growing in their understanding of how the concepts could be meaningfully engaged with for enhanced teaching and learning.

Day 2 of the indaba created opportunities for both students and staff from across the institution to share their respective insights and projects relating to decolonisation/ Africanisation within the context of their own fields of teaching and research. The Faculty of Education was very well represented on Day 2 of the indaba as well. In the first breakaway session Dr Lucky Maluleke, Dr Walters Do Nubia and Prof Heloise Sathorar presented a very insightful presentation on 'Decolonisation and Africa's Interdependence in Education, Economy and Culture'. This was followed by a presentation by Prof Deidre Geduld and Dr Noluvo Rangana entitled: 'Decolonising Student Teacher Engagement through Community Action Projects: A Humanising Approach'. Professor Athiemoolam rounded off this break away session by reflecting on the value of arts-based methodologies in his presentation aptly titled: 'Decolonising our Teaching through Drama and Theatrein-Education as Pedagogy'.

The colleagues' presentations were very well received by those in attendance including students and staff from various faculties, members of the Faculty of Education and colleagues from across the spectrum of higher education institutions, NGO's and university entities.

SWEDISH/NMU FACULTY OF EDUCATION COLLABORATIVE LANGUAGE RESEARCH ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVE

n April 2024 a group of Swedish academics and their PHD students, specialising in languages and language education, from various higher education institutions in Sweden, participated in two research workshops, and visited various schools in the Nelson Mandela Metropole. The programme was organised and facilitated by Professor Logamurthie Athiemoolam and Professor Nokhanyo Mdzanga, with the assistance of Mr Nkosinathi Mzuzu, acting head of the Centre for the Community Schools, who co-ordinated the school visits.

The Swedish academics, from a range of universities in Sweden including the universities of Stockholm, Gothenburg, Malmo, and Jonkoping, are part of a network of universities (CuEEd-LL) that work collaboratively to support Swedish PHD students in the fields of Languages and Language Education. The Swedish co-ordinator, Professor Ylva Lindberg, from Jonkoping University, worked closely with the NMU co-ordinators Prof Athiemoolam and Professor Mdzanga in the planning and execution of the programme.

THE FIRST DAY of the workshop focused on building collaborative partnerships between staff from the Faculty of Education of NMU and their Swedish counterparts. During this workshop colleagues from across the institutions were afforded opportunities to share their research initiatives in the fields of languages and language education with their counterparts. On the first day Professor Heloise Sathorar, acting dean of the Faculty of Education welcomed all the delegates and presented an overview of the South African education system, which set the scene for exploring researching possibilities

between colleagues from the NMU's Faculty of Education and Swedish colleagues. Thereafter academics from the Faculty of Education (NMU) and Sweden presented short papers on their current research projects and interests in the field of languages and language education.

Professor Ylva Lindberg specialising in Language and Literature from Jönköping University presented a paper entitled 'L1 teaching in the GenAl era', while Prof Nokhanyo Mdzanga from the Faculty of Education, also a language specialist, presented a paper entitled, 'Critical Perspectives on Language as a Social Justice Issue in Learning and Teaching.' This was followed by papers presented by Professor Linus Salö, Professor of Bilingualism from Stockholm University, who presented a paper entitled 'The Politics of Multilingualism in Sweden' and Professor Anna Nordenstam, Professor in Comparative Literature from the University of Gothenburg, who presented a paper entitled, 'Comics, Gender, Emotions and Upper Secondary School'. Thereafter, Ms Nadeema Musthan from the faculty presented a paper entitled, 'Mother tongue-based bilingual Education (MTBBE) in South Africa: The Struggle Continues' and Professor Magnus Persson, Professor in Literature and Education from Malmö University, presented a paper titled, 'Why literature? "High" Culture, Popular Culture and Passionate Reading'. This was followed by papers presented by Dr Rochelle Thorne from the faculty who presented a paper entitled, 'Learners' Understanding of Their Linguistic Resources as a Basis for Learning Natural Sciences' and Dr Lotta Olvergard, senior lecturer in Swedish as a Second Language from the University of Gothenburg, who presented a paper entitled, 'Disciplinary Literacy as Social Justice and Social Practice in Diverse Classrooms'. The presentations were rounded off by Dr Marie Rydenvald, a specialist in Multilingualism and Swedish as a second language from the University of Gothenburg, who presented a paper entitled, 'An Ecological Linguistic Perspective as Investment and Empowerment for Students Learning a Professional Language as Second Language Speakers' and Professor Athiemoolam who presented a paper entitled, 'Using Drama Pedagogy for Literature Teaching'.

The first day of the research networking programme was rounded off by Professor Athiemoolam, who facilitated the networking session on tableau building, aimed at exploring how the participants experienced the first day of the workshop, and what insights they had gained during the process for future research engagement projects. The participants were also taken on a guided tour of the Summerstrand South Campus that was co-ordinated by Mr Thato Moshesh.

THE SECOND DAY of the workshop focused on creating a space for PHD students from both Swedish universities and NMU's Faculty of Education to share their studies with their peers and academics for review and critique. The first PHD presentation was by Terese Kerstinsdotter from the University of Gothenburg who presented a research study entitled 'Pre-Service Teachers and Sensitive Issues in Fiction'. This was followed by a presentation by Ms Pretty Magangxa from the Faculty of Education who presented a paper entitled 'Exploring a Grade 1 Culturally Informed Literacy Pedagogy: A Case of isiXhosa Speakers'. Thereafter, Alexander Brauer from Malmo University presented his study entitled, 'Creative Writing as Cultural Empowerment and Educational use of Students' Funds of Knowledge'. This was followed by Lincoln Janssen, who presented a paper entitled, 'Exploring Chinese Learners' Understandings of Gender Using Critical Literacy in a Reading Club', which he presented online from China. Thereafter Björn Hagström from Gothenburg University presented a paper entitled, 'Newly Arrived Students' Language and Civic Education'. The presentations were rounded off by Zintle Bangiso-Fihla, who presented a paper entitled, 'Foundation Phase Student Teachers' Experiences of Teaching Mathematics Using isiXhosa during Teaching Practice'.

ON THE THIRD DAY of the programme, the colleagues were accompanied by colleagues from NMU on visits to four schools in the Nelson Mandela Metropole namely, Cebelihle and Charles Duna Primary, and Sanctor and Kwezi Lomso Secondary schools, where they observed lessons in languages and how teachers used translanguaging to teach across the curriculum. The third day was rounded off with a reflection session on the Missionvale Campus aimed at exploring how the Swedish colleagues experienced the lesson observation sessions at the respective schools, followed by a presentation by Mr Mzuzu, the Acting Head of CCS (Centre for the Community Schools), on the various

community projects that the centre is currently engaged in.

The 3-day workshop programme that aimed at building bridges across the NMU's Faculty of Education and Swedish universities, succeeded in showcasing the research initiatives of both PHD students and staff in the fields of languages and language education across the various institutions, thereby setting the scene for more engaged research partnerships in the future. Future short term goals in the field of language education between Jonkoping University and the Faculty of Education include a proposal for a special issue in the Educational Journal for Social Change on cultural empowerment through multilingualism, exchanging syllabuses in language and literature teaching, guest lecturing, online PHD seminars, serving as examiners for Masters and doctoral students, online PHD seminars, serving as critical readers for PHD students' theses, and participating in the EU global teacher project. Mid-term goals include exchange visits involving lecturers and PHD students between the two institutions, and long- term goals include co-supervision of masters and doctoral students.

On the side class demonstration progressed where Ms Makaluza was visiting schools to monitor the progress of the teachers, just to see if they are implementing what they have learned and to see improvement.

She said "I have advocated for my birth province (Eastern Cape) to convince the investors to continue to fund this project and I put myself up for the monitoring and carrying out this project to success therefore please work with me and attend all of these workshops and make sure to submit those feedback as they determine the future of these workshops"

The workshop and subsequent demonstrations were met with enthusiasm and gratitude from the participating teachers. Many expressed how the experience had rekindled their passion for teaching and provided them with practical tools to better engage their students.

One participant remarked, "The workshop was incredibly enlightening. I now feel more equipped to create a dynamic and interactive learning environment for my students. Siphokuhle Makaluza's insights were invaluable, and I can't wait to apply what I've learned in my classroom."




ADDING SIGNIFICANT VALUE IN EDUCATION
