Mutual and reciprocal learning in hospitable Zanzibar

Envisioning Africa without HIV & AIDS

HIV and AIDS Education Conference, Zanzibar, 27-28 September 2011

This conference - an outcome of the tri-partite meeting (UDSM, NMMU and Carl von Ossietzky University) held at UDSM in September 2010 - provided a much needed platform for the in-depth exploration of how education could act both as a prevention agent for HIV and AIDS, and as a means of mitigating the impact of the pandemic. Unlike most HIV and AIDS conferences, this was focussed solely on the relationship between HIV and AIDS and education and was attended by participants who have first-hand knowledge and experience of the pandemic on the continent. Delegates came not only from institutes of higher learning, but also from schools, community agencies and governmental agencies.

One of the highlights of the conference was an address by Dr Mohammed Dahoma, the Director of Preventive Services in the Ministry of Health in Zanzibar. Although Zanzibar has only 1% prevalence of HIV, the government is active in prevention to ensure that this figure does not rise.

The delegates (pictured alongside) from South Africa, Tanzania and Zanzibar engaged in deep discussion of issues around the theme, envisioning Africa without AIDS. For many of the Tanzanian delegates, this was the first time that they had been exposed to participatory methods of research but they would like to learn more about how they could be used to prepare teachers and community workers for HIV prevention. Similarly, the South Africans learnt much from the community work being undertaken in Tanzania. Mutual and

reciprocal learning thus took place, something that is sometimes missing in larger conferences. The whole conference was a learning experience which enriched the professional development of all who attended.

Personal relationships were also enriched through the social activities. hospitality created a relaxed and fun atmosphere for the delegates to unwind and cement newfound friendships. Much networking, and dancing, took place at the conference dinner!

Proposed outputs of the conference include forming a committee from the University of Dar Es Salaam and NMMU to organise another, similar conference in the future. Profs de Lange and Wood will also travel to Tanzania to give workshops on visual methodologies for post-graduate students at UDSM and other organisations. Dr Kitila Mkumbo will also travel to Port Elizabeth in November to attend the SAHARA conference at NMMU.

During the recently held **student governance elections**, two Education students were elected by their peers to represent them on the SRC.

Dwain Samuels (B Ed FET, pictured alongside) was elected on to the SRC in George as Academic Officer: "I am a SASCO member and have been serving the organisation on the Branch Executive Committee for this past year. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve my fellow students in such an important office as Academic Officer".

Prof Pat Bean, Head of Programme for B Ed FET George, commented "Student governance plays (should play) a critical role in higher education and we are proud that a prospective teacher has been acknowledged by his peers to represent them."

On South Campus, Mthunzi Dingela (B Ed FET) was elected as Faculty Rep for Education. Congrats Mthunzi!

Faculty Curriculum Colloquium was held on October, where perspectives from different lavers stakeholders (faculty staff, students and principals) were shared on curriculum. Facilitated by Trisha Lord and Candice Smith along thinking environment principles, the daylong event proved most significant, the outcomes of which will form the basis of the re-curriculation work going forward.

Renowned visiting scholars

The faculty has been honoured to have two visiting scholars during October, Prof Anne Hickling-Hudson of Australia and Sheila Graham from Jamaica. In amongst their programme of various faculty related events, student lectures and research meetings, they each delivered a public lecture and actively participated in the Faculty Curriculum Colloquium.

Prof Hickling-Hudson is an Associate Professor in the School of Cultural and Language Studies in Education at Queensland University of Technology. Widely published, she is a pioneer in using postcolonial theory as a technique of comparative education. Her research focus is on analysing educational policy and national development, teacher education and the intercultural curriculum. She has been deeply involved in socioeducational reform, curriculum design and the education of teachers in decolonising societies. She worked with the late Paulo Freire to prepare teachers in the Caribbean for educational change. Since 1991, she has designed and implemented university courses to prepare educators for teaching and has helped promote indigenous studies in teacher education.





Sheila Graham is joint Founder and Artistic Director of *The Area Youth Foundation (AYF)*, a non-governmental, charitable organization whose unique methodology harnesses the expressive arts as educational, social, cultural development tools to:

- Stimulate personal development and behaviour change
- Impart useful skills which enhance opportunities for employment and entrepreneurship
- Carry out programmes for violence prevention and the promotion of healthy lifestyles
- Carry out programmes in marginalized communities for the promotion of social cohesion

Through the training process participants have generated a range of creative products, including songs, music videos, musical dramas, video documentaries. These products have been presented live and on screens and stages in Jamaica, the US, UK and Italy.

German delegation visit
