# New Faculty Vision and Mission

The final re-visioning workshop in the series of five facilitated workshops was held in early June at the Missionvale VIP Lounge, and facilitated by Ilze Olckers. To mark the workshop as the final in this process, participants were able to journey through a 'memory room' which was populated with materials gathered during the previous workshops and included items such as poems, photographs, mind maps, quotes, cartoons and the like.

The Re-Visioning Journey, which the faculty has been collectively engaged in over the past year, yielded a clear and inspiring new Vision and Mission for the Faculty based on 'harvesting' from the past year of shared ideas, debates, passions, inspiration and commitment of all who participated in the journey. And, the majority of staff in the faculty has consistently and enthusiastically been involved.

The new Vision and Mission will inform the faculty's strategic direction going forward and its operational plans over the next few years, and aligns to the University's Vision 2020. A result of great team effort over the past year, Executive Dean, Prof Denise Zinn, acknowledged the staff commitment to the process, "Many thanks for your enthusiastic and committed participation, and I look forward to the continuation of our journey together as we seek to live our vision and mission in the faculty".

# First Faculty HUB Colloquium

The mainly-untapped resource that is embodied in the HUBs was most definitely show-cased at this colloquium and everybody is looking forward to see the nature of their future developments", observed Prof Nonnie Botha.

#### **Research Seminar Series 2011**

His vibrant presentation explored the perceptions of urban, suburban, rural and farm school principals on the Advanced Certificate in Education: School Leadership (ACE SL) programme offered by the faculty. One of the recommendations of his research (i.e. to develop a WILCs model that could be utilised by professional development programmes to enhance collegial leadership) was also examined.

## Eclipsing Expectations in Turkey

Sabanci University's School of Languages in the town of Tuzla on the outskirts of Istanbul in Turkey held its 2<sup>nd</sup> International Conference on Language Education from the 2-4<sup>th</sup> of June. The conference was attended by 350 delegates from across the globe and included a number of papers presented by students' who reported on their own cognitive experiences during the processes of learning a second, and sometimes third, language.

**Dr Logan Athiemoolam** presented a paper at the conference entitled *'Using Drama-In-Education to Make Students' Voices Heard'* which showcased his action research project that demonstrated how students' inherent talents in drama, dance and music could be used to make their voices heard. The paper aimed to demonstrate how by tapping into the students' innate talents they could make remarkable progress both verbally and academically thereby unleashing their creative voices. The process of unleashing their creative voices eclipsed this lecturer's expectations, which was in keeping with the theme of the conference, *Eclipsing Expectations*. Logan's paper was very well received as many present had not yet experimented with creative approaches, but tended to use the traditional teacher centred approaches.

A highlight of the conference was the direct satellite link with Howard Gardner, Harvard University, who presented an inspiring, thought provoking paper on multiple intelligences, a field in which he is a prolific and leading exponent.

Students from Qumbu and Bizana currently pursuing the ACE-LLT programme of study presented short action research papers on their research in language related issues at mini-conferences organised at both off-campus sites in May.

They presented their research papers to an audience comprising their peers, facilitators and the module co-ordinator. Their presentations were assessed by the module co-ordinator, Logan Athiemoolam and Joe Slingers, an external examiner, who also co-ordinates other language related modules that constitute the programme.

The students presented papers of a high standard and gave a very good account of themselves in spite of the fact that the majority of them had no prior experience in making such presentations.

The mini-conferences were very well organised and co-ordinated by both the centre managers Yolisa Dudula (Qumbu) and Yolisa Magidela (Bizana) and the tutors namely Mandisa Ntengwana and Berrington Gcobingca. The latter also made a concerted effort to ensure that the students were adequately prepared for their presentations.

The mini-conference at both centres was a great success thanks to the support from centre-managers and tutors responsible for facilitating the research module namely 'Introduction to Research in Classrooms'.
